

OVERVIEW OF SCHOOL CIVICS CELEBRATION PROJECT

FOCUS ON CELEBRATING STUDENT-LED CIVICS PROJECTS

Updated for the 2022-23 School Year

Student-led Civics Projects became a formalized portion of the curriculum through enactment in 2018 of S2631, An Act to promote and enhance civic engagement. The League of Women Voters of MA advocated for passage of this law through its partnership with the Massachusetts Civic Learning Coalition, (MCLC). This law states that schools are to make available **student-led civics projects** in Grade 8 and in at least one additional opportunity in Grades 9-12. Most schools are choosing to make this experience available in a required course so that it is accessible to all students.

MISSION

The League believes in the importance of preparing youth for their role as participants in a democracy. Active civic engagement is essential to help democracy work. To this end the League wishes to celebrate the importance of the work that students are doing on student-led civics projects and amplify youth voices. We would like to bring about broad recognition for all students engaging in this work at the local level. At the regional/state level, we would like to create an opportunity for student interaction with each other and with legislators and experts to help refine their projects and offer special recognition for exemplary student-led civics projects. Our goal is to create excitement among students and teachers about these civic engagement projects and encourage students to see civic skills as life-long skills that will allow them to continue to find ways to improve our communities and our shared future.

CIVICS CELEBRATION PROGRAM DESIGN

Note: While this document describes the celebration of student-led civics projects, it is possible that Leagues can support these projects at the beginning and middle stages of the projects also. To see how local leagues can do that, see the **LWVMA School Civics Celebration Project Toolkit and the document Options For Local League Support of Student-led Civics Projects.**)

The Celebration Program Design consists of a local level project for spring 2023 and a state level pilot project for late spring 2023 that local League members can participate in.

STEP 1: THE LOCAL LEVEL – Invitations to schools should be initiated in late fall. Celebration events happen in May/June (Interested Schools will select option 1, option 2, or an alternative based on their readiness.

Option 1. Local Community Showcase: To celebrate the importance of the student-led civics projects completed by all students, we propose that local Leagues work collaboratively with school districts to design a community showcase for the student-led civics projects. The local League would **invite** schools to participate, and these events would

only happen with school acceptance and collaboration. The purpose of the community showcase would be to appreciate the work that students have done and commend them for their exploration of community issues and ways to address them.

This community event would invite parents, local officials in elected or appointed positions, civic organizations, League members and other community influencers. The specific showcase implementation at each school district would be determined in collaboration with school staff. Students could be awarded certificates of civic engagement and local publicity highlighting student work would also be arranged. The showcase could be for Grade 8 and for high school projects. If the Grade 8 students are not a part of the high school, it could be a separate event for their schools. This could be done in person or virtually.

Option 2. Local Cable TV Interviews: The school selects exemplary student projects, and those students are interviewed on a local cable access program or series of programs. This approach may be more appealing to Leagues and schools that don't feel they have the time for a large event, or whom feel that a large public event is still not advisable as we continue to deal with Covid-19.

Note: We have found in our discussions with schools thus far, some of the schools are ready for Option 1, but others only feel ready for Option 2. Schools should select their preferred option, or suggest an alternative, which is option 3.

Option 3, An Alternative Option Designed by the School and the Local League:

Schools may have an idea for a customized option that they prefer and Local Leagues are encouraged to tailor celebrations to the school's preferences. For example, some schools choose to have individual classes present their project during a class period and invite League members in at that time to be an audience, to serve as a judge, or to simply give constructive feedback.

League Role –

- The state League will prepare a support package of resource material to help local Leagues collaborate with their local schools on this project. This material is located in the School Civics Celebration Project Toolkit on the LWVMA website.
- Local Leagues will be asked to reach out to schools containing Grade 8 and Grades 9-12 that they work with, to invite them to participate
- The state League will distribute through local Leagues information about the MCLC Civics Learning Week that will be held in March.
- All local Leagues will be asked to routinely distribute electronically, the MCLC Newsletter to the schools they work with. This will be distributed through the Civicsed Google Group and Leagues who wish to participate in these projects are asked to notify the LWVMA office that they wish to be placed on this group email list. STEP 2: STATE PILOT SHOWCASE OF STUDENT WORK – May/June date to be announced soon.

The Department of Elementary and Secondary Education will offer a state showcase of student civics projects and schools are asked to apply to participate by December. DESE

will select schools in February for participation. Schools that presently work with Generation Citizen will be able to participate in the Generation State Civics Day as an alternative to the showcase sponsored by DESE.

LWVMA participated in a small project planning group to help DESE shape their thinking about this event. LWVMA has also offered to fund raise to support food for the state showcase, since DESE is prohibited from using funds for food. Additionally, we have offered to recruit League members to serve as judges at the State Showcase event.

Funding may be available for districts to support costs associated with hosting the local showcases and for transportation costs for students attending the state-wide event.
